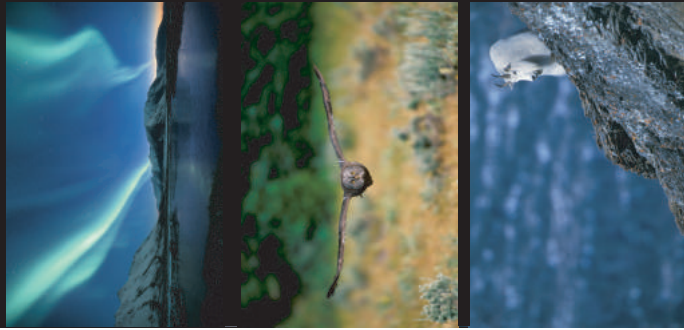

# Join us Autumn Quarter for a Seminar exploring yellowstone to yukon freedom to roam

The Yellowstone to Yukon region, stretching across the northern mountain backbone of North America, is a wild land where grizzly bears roam, where wolves howl and salmon and trout run in clear, cold streams. The proposed Yellowstone to Yukon corridor aims to maintain the great diversity of this region by connecting the public lands of this expanse through an array of conservation efforts. This fall, join the University of Washington and the Burke Museum as we host an 8-part lecture series to explore the science, politics, people and ethics behind this vision. Each Tuesday evening, invited speakers will share their perspective on the possibilities and the challenges of the Y2Y.

GEN ST 391 and CFR 595 are 2-credit courses designed to give UW undergraduate and graduate students an opportunity to teach the ideas they learn in ENVR 450 to Burke Museum visitors.
