HSTCMP 247 BEFORE GLOBL HEALTH

Traces the roots of the modern global health movement by examining the history of overseas interventions in medicine and public health from the fifteenth century to the present. Focuses primarily on Latin America while including case studies on Africa, Asia, Australia, and the Pacific.

HSTLAC 185 LATIN AMER SOC/HIST

16066 A 5 TTh 130-320 GWN 201 Rodriguez Silva,Ileana M

Explores the power struggles generated by imperial expansion, colonialism, and processes of nation-formation (1400 to the present) in the forging of Latin America and the Caribbean. Examines how gender, race, sex, and class became crucial means to sustain, navigate, and challenge domination as well as to imagine alternative futures.

CONTEMPORARY LATIN AMERICA COURSES

JSIS 480 (SLN 21248) / C LIT 321 LIT OF AMERICAS: The 'Dirty Wars' in Fiction and Film

11961 A 5 MW 1230-220 MGH 254 Steele,Cynthia

During the 1970s attempts at social reform in several South American were violently cut short by coups installing repressive military dictatorships, with support from the U.S. This class will focus on four short novels and fourteen films from two of countries, Chile (1973-1988) and Argentina (1976-1983). In the case of Chile, the international film *Missing* provided early evidence of the rampant human rights abuses. Eventually the dictatorship was brought to an end by a popular plebiscite, as portrayed in the novel *The Days of the Rainbow* and the film *No*. The Argentine film *The Secret in their Eyes*, which won the Academy Award for best foreign film, was remade by Hollywood; we will compare the novel and both films versions. Among the issues we will explore are ways of denouncing human rights abuses and of expressing personal and collective trauma through fiction and film, the connection between fiction and autobiography, and the adaptation of literature as film.

CMS 320 CINEMA AND NATION - Horror film in Spain and Latin America

CHSTU 200 LATINOS IN THE US: Patterns of Racial, Ethnic, and Socio-Economic and Political Inequality
