Zionism aimed to transform Jewish life in wide-ranging ways. This course examines how the Yishuv – the Jewish community in the “Land of Israel” before the establishment of the State of Israel” before the establishment of the State of Israel – created a new “Hebrew” culture through a revival of the Hebrew language and through literature, art, architecture, folksong, and public ceremonies. Focusing on the years 1882-1948, we will consider how the Yishuv constructed a new definition of “Jews” as “Hebrews,” and how the effort to forge a synthesis of tradition and innovation expressed itself in clothing, labor practices, religious observances, collective rituals, and city planning.
