RELIG 201 A RELIGIONS, WESTERN (5 Cr) J. WELLMAN

This course is a comparative introduction to Judaism, Christianity and Islam. While each of these traditions arose within the Middle East their influence has spread across all the continents. We will track these diverse traditions in their historical development, examining their ideas, practices and consequences on Western culture.

This course is a broad survey of the ancient Mediterranean world from the ancient city-states of Sumner in Mesopotamia to the rise of Islam. HIST 111 is the first of a three-quarter sequence on the history of Western Civilization. It is not necessary to take all three quarters, or to take them in order.

Students will leave the course with a cogent picture of the broad sweep of the cultural history of the Jews from roughly the mid-first millennium BCE till the 20th century. Key creative epochs of this history will be explored in depth: e.g., the emergence of rabbinic culture, the interaction of rabbinic culture with Christian and Islamic cultures, the development of the Sephardic diaspora, the modernization of Jewish cultures in Western Europe, Eastern Europe, and the Ottoman Empire, the creation of distinctive Jewish cultures in North America and the State of Israel.

SLN: 13817 HIST 311 A SCIENCE IN CIVIL: ANTIQUITY TO 1600 (5 Cr) B. HEVLY

MTWTh: 9:30-10:20 RAI 121
SLN: 13818 AA - QZ F: 8:30-9:20 BAG 106 (Other QZ sessions available)

This course is an introduction to the history of science from prehistory to the early seventeenth century, and to the means by which historians of science construct such narratives. It will begin with the idea of science as a culture's systematic worldview, dependent on a view of nature in context, by looking at cosmological ideas in prehistory. The course will then look at the creation of natural knowledge in Egypt, Mesopotamia, classical Greece and Rome, early Islam, medieval and renaissance Europe. We will look at questions of cause and effect related to astronomy, optics, mathematics, the sciences of motion, biology and medicine, and relate them to cultural contexts.

SLN: 18426 HIST 361 A MIDEAST 1453-1800 (5 Cr) F. SCHWARZ

TTh 2:30-4:20 SIG 224

This course is an introduction to the early modern period in the Middle East. The period from the 15th to the 18th centuries is characterized by the political, economic and cultural dominance of two empires, the Ottoman Empire and Safavid Iran. The course explores the political and social dynamics and cultural transformations of the two empires by taking a thematic approach. Topics include: religious communities; gender; commerce, consumption and international trade; townspeople, farmers and nomads; self and others; conflict, negotiation and coexistence. It is the second of a three-quarter series on the history of the Middle East from the 6th century to the present. The three quarters may not be offered in order. It is not necessary to take all three quarters.

TTh 1:30-3:20 THO 135

How democracies since 1945 have linked security policies from the level of domestic politics to the level of alliance politics to the global level at which democracies confront non-democracies. Examines the applicability of 'realist international relations theory' and other conceptual approaches. Examines case studies, such as the evolution of the US-Japan security relationship and its impact on Japanese domestic politics; the impact of the US alliance system on the civil rights movement in the US; the relationship between the "norms" of the NATO alliance system and the NATO decisions to intervene in the ethno-nationalist wars of Yugoslavia; the relationship between the US military alliance system and non-proliferation regimes in Europe, East Asia, the zone encompassing the mid-east and south Asia; the domestic and alliance politics of the Bush Administration's doctrine of pre-emption as applied to Iraq as a 'non-proliferation' policy and an 'anti-terrorism' policy.

Third, we will examine how and under what conditions non-state actors such as NGOs, multinational firms, and international organizations influence world politics.

WOMEN'S RIGHTS IN ISLAM (5 Cr)

This course focuses on women's political and legal status in Islamic societies today, with an emphasis on their everyday, lived experiences. Working to unpack stereotypes of women in Islamic societies, readings will focus on local settings in order to examine particular conditions, including the political, economic, social, and historical, through which the women in these societies perceive their status, rights, as well as their identities. Students will engage with feminist theory, post-colonial theory, and theories of the state to better understand and explore women's rights and politics in Islamic societies. Finally, students will be introduced to debates regarding human rights and women in Islam to examine issues underlying the question of Islam's conformity with international standards of human rights.

MWF 10:30-11:20 JHN 102

This course will examine the Arab-Israeli conflict during this century as a process with three distinct phases. The first phase lasted from about 1905 to 1948 and was primarily a conflict between Jewish immigrants and Palestinian Arabs to create basic institutions of a state. The second phase, from 1949 to 1984, was primarily a conflict between existing states. The third phase, from 1985 to the present has again become a conflict between a Palestinian community in the West Bank/Gaza and Israel over the creation of new state institutions. The basic institutions of a state include the armed forces, central bureaucracies, representative institutions and legal systems which undertake the substantive tasks of defining property rights, allocating goods, and adjudicating conflicts. The Arab-Israeli conflict is thus properly several conflicts, between the Zionist and Palestinian movements, between Israel and the surrounding Arab states, and between the Palestine Authority and Israel.
