Jewish esoteric thought from antiquity to early modern times. Emergence of Spanish Kabbalah. The thought of Isaac Luria and its immense influence in Jewish history through other movements—specifically the mystical messiah. Sabbetai Sevi, and the rise of Hasidism. The main educational goal of the course is to introduce students to some of the difficulties in defining the mystical dimension of religion in general. Secondly, it is to acquaint students with the history and symbolic languages of those streams in Judaism that are most usually regarded as examples of mysticism. The emphasis of the course changes from year to year, but in most offerings we stress themes of heavenly travel ("merkavah" mysticism), contemplative interaction with the divine reality ("qabbalah"), and revivalistic piety ("hasidism").
