COURSES AND TEACHING

Regularly offered courses

- **Introduction to Judaism** (RELIG / JEW ST 145): redeveloped this required core course with a religious studies perspective for the program in Jewish Studies (2017 and 2019).
- **Introduction to Western Religions** (RELIG 201): redeveloped this required core course with equal emphases on Judaism, Christianity, and Islam for the comparative religion program. I have been increasing enrollment after a prolonged decline (offered winters of 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020).
- **Gender, Sex, and Religion** (RELIG/GWSS 334/534): developed this course to attract students to the study of religion. This is the only religion course cross-listed with the Gender, Women, and Sexuality Studies and serves a wide variety of students without any background in the study of religion (2016, 2019, 2020).
- **Introduction to Rabbinic Literature** (JSIS C 258): developed this course for undergraduates and rebranded it as JEW ST 330/530 “The Sages: Foundations of Classical Judaism.” I offer this course every other year (2015, 2017, 2019).
- **Angels: From the Bible to American Spirituality** (RELIG 440). Building on my book project, I developed this advanced seminar on angels in religious texts. Though its first iteration attracted 25 students from all over the university, I realized it functions best with

students with some background in the study of religion. Current enrollment is 10 students, about half seniors and half graduate students.

Out of Rotation

- **Beyond Comparison:** Judaism and Christianity (2016): developed this graduate seminar for Comparative Religion MA students and doctoral students.
- **Protest Movements in the US and the World** (2014 and 2017): Building on my research into religious movements as protest movement in antiquity, I developed this seminar for the International Studies major (JSIS 498).
- **Heroes, Heretics, and Radicals:** the Origins of Judaism and Christianity (JSIS C 155): developed this new course to appeal to new undergraduate audiences (2015 and 2016).

In Development

- **Lessons from the Holocaust:** I am organizing this team-taught course for the Autumn of 2020, which will invite faculty participation from across the university. Based on faculty, student, and public response, we will either proceed with the creation of a Holocaust Studies minor or continue offering this team-taught course.
- **Catastrophe and Resilience:** In conjunction with my next book project, I plan to develop a hybrid undergrad/grad seminar on ancient Jewish responses to catastrophe and exile. It will incorporate material from my courses that are out of rotation as well as from ancient Jewish texts that are generally omitted from the regular curriculum: apocryphal texts, ancient texts from Hellenistic Egypt, and synagogue art and liturgy.
