Dr. Roberto Dondisch serves as Consul of Mexico in Seattle. Prior, he was Director-General for Global Issues in Mexico's Ministry of Foreign Affairs, where he also acted as Chief Negotiator for Mexico for the Post-2015 Development Agenda and Climate Change processes, and was elected as Vice President of the UN negotiating process for the Arms Trade Treaty, among other roles.

Dr. Dondisch holds a Ph.D. in International Relations from Johns Hopkins University. An author of a wide range of publications on political risk, multilateral negotiations, security and democratic governance, he has taught at Universidad Iberoamericana, among other academic institutions.
