PORT 105 Intensive Portuguese for Spanish Speakers (6) VLPA

If you speak Spanish, you can understand more than 50% of Portuguese texts without any previous knowledge.

Portuguese 105 is an accelerated class for Spanish Speakers, which focuses on the similarities and differences between Portuguese and Spanish.

Pre-requisites: SPAN 203 or SPAN 216; or SPAN 301, 302, 303, 314, 315, 316, any of which can be taken concurrently. Native Speakers of Spanish are also welcome.



C LIT 321 / JSIS 480B Beyond Dictatorship in the Americas: Fiction and Film (5, max. 15) VLPA

As a window into Latin American societies' attempts to recover from and seek justice from the military dictatorships of the 1970s and 1980s, we will study several representative films and short novels from Argentina and Chile. In the case of Argentina, we will study the novels *Kamchatka* and *The Secret in their Eyes* and the films *Chronicle of an Escape*, *Clandestine Childhood*, *Kamchatka* and *The Secret in their Eyes*. Regarding Chile, we will read Antonio Skármeta's novel *The Days of the Rainbow* and study the films *Tony Manero*, *Post-Mortem* and *No*. Students will keep a reading and viewing journal and write two short analytical essays.

C LIT 315 National Cinemas (3-5, max. 15) VLPA

With the two recent Academy Awards won by director Alejandro González Iñárritu, Mexican film has begun to recuperate the international prominence that it had during its Golden Age of the 1930s-1950s. The New Mexican Cinema of the 2000s has attracted worldwide attention for its combination of sophisticated film techniques and subtle critique of Mexican and global societies. In this class we will watch two of the great films from the Golden Age, *María Candelaria* and *Los Olvidados*, along with five of the more recent films, including *Amores perros*, *Y tu mamá también*, *Sin dejar huella*, and *Crimson Peak*, along with pertinent readings. Students will keep a viewing and reading journal and write two short essays.
