Personal Narratives of Modernization from Rural South Korea

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Youngmi Kim is currently an associate professor of Korean history at Kookmin University in Seoul Korea. She graduated from Korean history department of Seoul National University in 1990 and received her Ph. D. in Korean history from Seoul National University in 2005. She conducts research on South Korea's rural modernization, Saemaül ("New Village") Movement of the Park Chung Hee government in 1970s, particularly through field work and oral history methodology. She published *Tongwŏn kwa chŏhang : haebang chŏnhu Seoul ŭi Chumin Sahoesa* (Mobilization and Resistance : Social History of Seoul Residents before and after the Liberation) and *Kŭtŭl ŭi Saemaül undong : han maül kwa han nonch'on undongka rŭl t'onghaesŏ bon minjung dŭr ŭi Saewmaül undong iyagi* (Their Saemaül Movement : Saemaül Movement stories focused on the experiences of a village and a rural activist) in 2009.
