Add (Entry) Codes

- > Entry codes are five-digit numbers issued to students by academic departments as authorization to add or drop in restricted course sections.
- > **Entry codes are one-time use codes**
- > Once the add codes are available, instructors, OAS or your department coordinator may issue Add (Entry) Codes to students.
- > Directions on where to obtain an entry code are in the comment section of the Time Schedule

How to get an add code?

- > Please send an email to Elçin to get lists of the add codes.

*Once a list of entry codes is ordered, it takes up to 12-24 hours to download.



Faculty Code

- Independent study courses such as 499, 600, 700, or 800 require students to obtain a **Faculty Code** from the department.
- This is not add code restriction.

Please direct the students to **jsisadv@uw.edu** or Elçin to obtain a faculty code.

- **Independent study form and instructor approval are required to get a faculty code.**

Please contact program advisers to get an independent study form.



Disability Accommodation Requests

- Every quarter the time schedule office requires us to submit any special accommodation (for faculty only), such as mobility, allergy, etc.
- These requests are considered when the time schedule office arranges the rooms.
- Any accommodation request has to be submitted to Elcin before the time schedule construction is turned off.
- This is not related to UW The Disability Services Office; this is only for arranging the disability-friendly classroom for the faculty.

JSIS New Major Launch Autumn 2021

- > Global and Regional Studies (general) major fully approved
- > Eventually replaces International Studies major
- > Added to JSIS website list of majors
- > Encoded in DARS, available for student degree audit in MyPlan (“Global and Regional Studies”)



Why redesign the general IS major?

- **New options for specialization:** Focus your work by combining new thematic and regional concentrations (instead of “tracks”)
- **Access, equity and diversity:** An “open” major (instead of application-based entry) is part of creating a more diverse and inclusive JSIS student cohort.
- **Provide choices in capstone experience:** Task Force, Public Writing Seminar (or both)
- **Smooth path toward graduations:** From 70 to 50 required credits

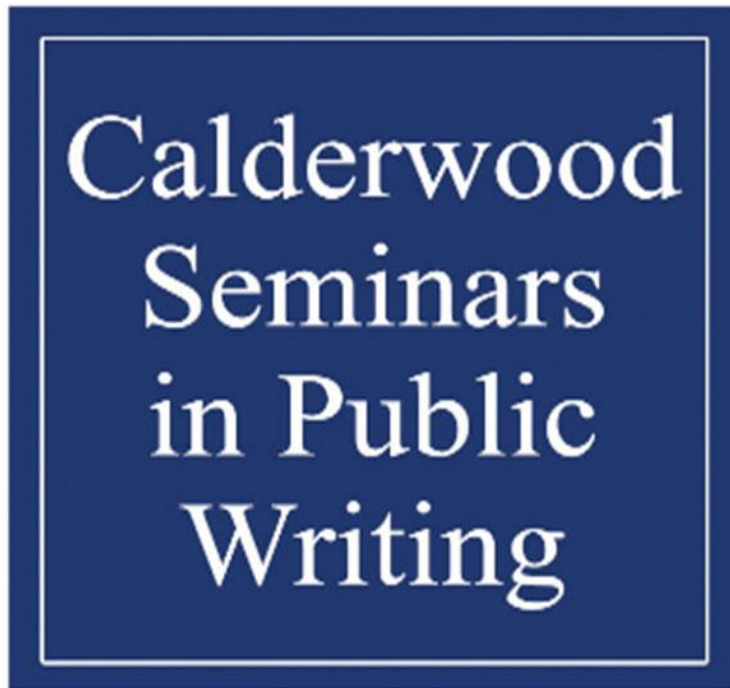

New Grad. Students Orientation:

 - Requirements include excellent academic standing, responsibility, no FLAS, diversity & equity



New residency requirements from the UW registrar

The registrar's office today announced that international students and non-residents can become "Washington state residents for tuition purposes":

Students will need to have a high school diploma from anywhere and will need to have had their primary address in the US for one year prior to being eligible, international students will need to declare that they intend to become permanent residents when legally able to.

- Positively impacts US and international students' ability to pursue their education at resident tuition rates
- Increases the number of scholarships and fellowships non-residents and international students can apply to
