Reframing of Franz Boas's Documentation of the Kwakiutl First Nation in 1930."

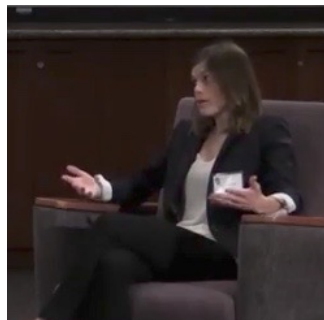
Indigenous Influence in Arctic Affairs Video Series

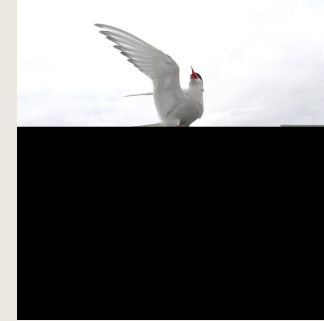
