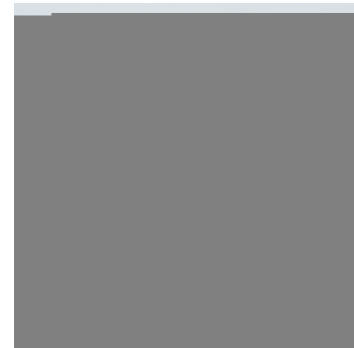
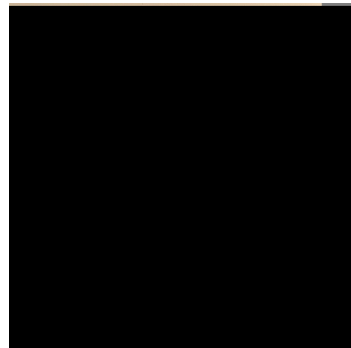
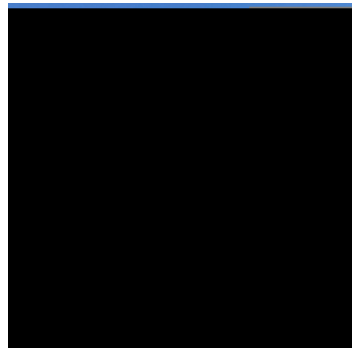
Collaboration mobility research grant from University of British Columbia for faculty field course
