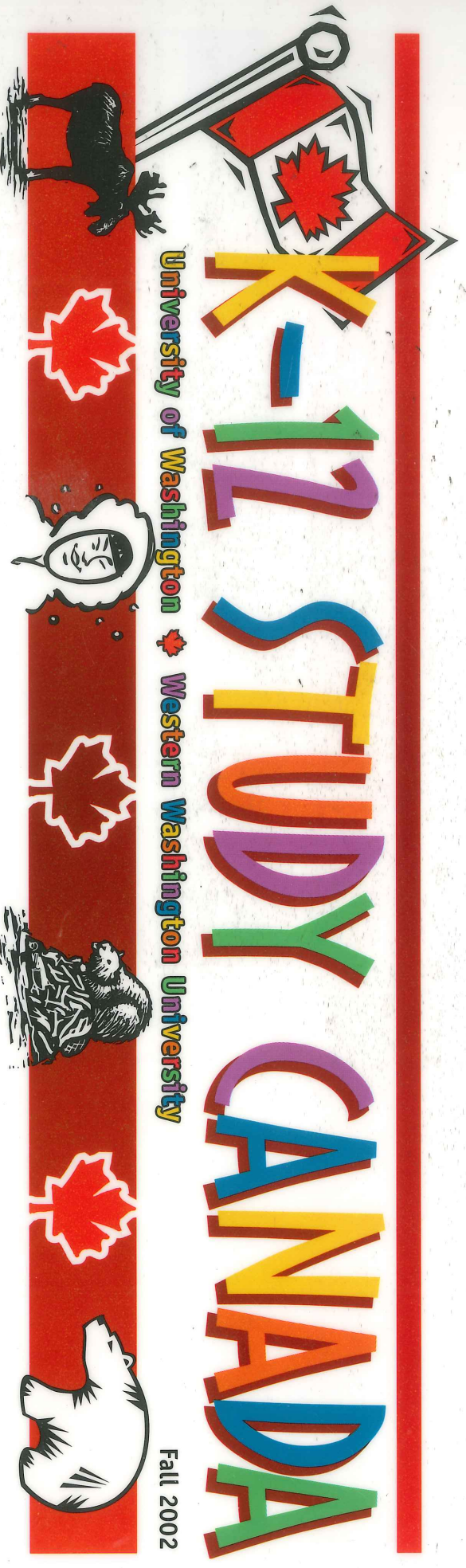




Welcome to the 2002-03 school year! We have a wealth of workshops, presentations and resources to assist in bringing Canada to the classroom. More than ever, American educators are realizing the importance of international education and what better place to start than with our closest foreign neighbor, Canada.

This fall we are offering two workshops, "Canada on the WWW" that will introduce educators to informative sites on a variety of topics, and a workshop on environmental issues in our shared bioregion. Also, it isn't too early to sign up for the 3rd annual documentary film workshop (Feb. 1) featuring current Canadian documentary films. In addition, both Tina and I will be presenting at a number of workshops and conferences both regionally and nationally (see reverse).

The 2001-02 year was a very successful one with over 300 teachers attending our workshops and hundreds more visiting Tina's K-12 STUDY CANADA resource displays. There has

been such an enthusiastic response to the K-12 STUDY CANADA Resource Valise that a second copy of it is now "on the road," along with two K-12 STUDY CANADA Student Novel Collections. This year the teacher loan-kits will continue their cross-country travels and reach teachers as far away as DE, PA, TX, AZ, MI and CO! The 2002 STUDY CANADA Summer Institute was a great success with educators participating from around the country. In addition, almost 200 students attended presentations on Canada via visits to the universities and attendance at UW's World Languages Day and the Model United Nations program.

"Canadian History." Congratulations to Jessica Perry and Danny Gunderson from Burlington-Edison High School who won first place for their exhibit on Canadian borders. 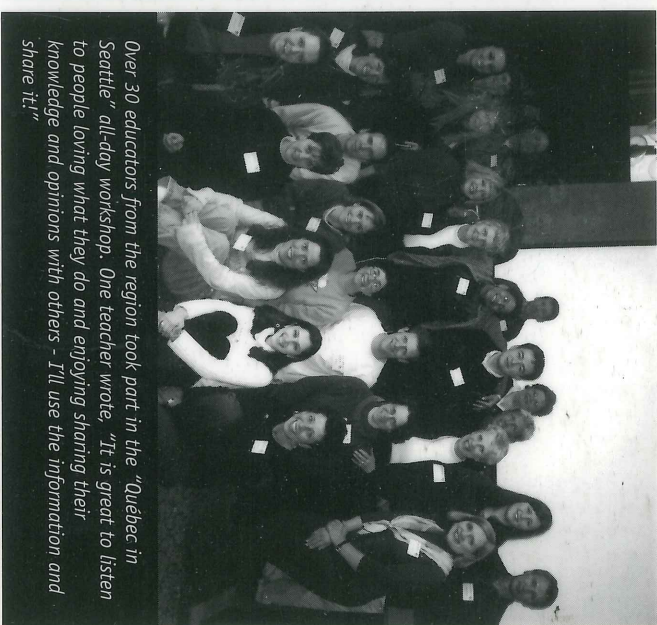

Canada is part of the curriculum taught in America's public schools. In the absence of traditional library resources for teaching Canada, teachers need to locate web-based information that is reliable. This workshop will guide teachers to a wealth of web-based information on Canada while providing them with the ongoing ability to locate and judge the accuracy and reliability of online Canadiana.

Cheri Rausser, a professional librarian (MLIS) possessing academic credentials in Canadian Studies (MA) and professional experience in heritage conservation, teaching and research will facilitate the workshop. She currently works as a media librarian managing a multimedia studio archive for a major Canadian corporation.

This workshop will give educators ideas about how to bring environmental science into the classroom. Speakers will discuss the ecosystem approach to protecting trans-boundary environments, particularly the Puget Sound and Georgia Basin region, and how to manage media and public involvement activities. Presenters will include Michael Rytko, Senior Scientist, and Melanie Luh, Director, from the Office of Ecosystems and Communities at EPA, and David Fraser, Senior Advisor, Canada-US Relations, Environment Canada. Nadine Fabbi will also present on the impact of early uranium mining on the health of the Dene people of Great Bear Lake, Northwest Territories, and their unwitting role in the creation of the first atom bombs.

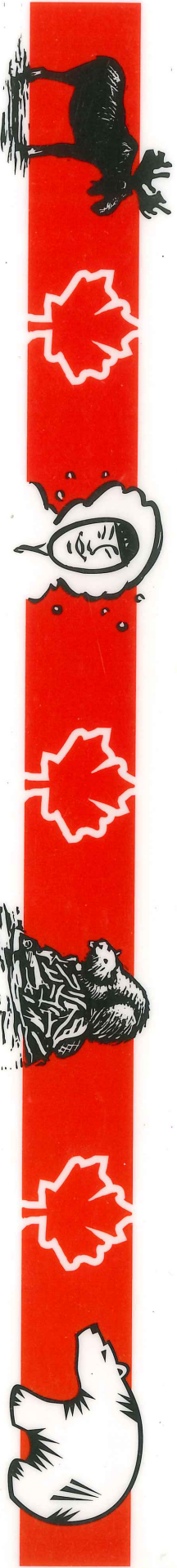
This all-day workshop, taught by Carol Hermer, president of the Society for Visual Anthropology, will show educators how to use documentary films to teach students about cultural diversity and cross-cultural understanding. Hermer is an adjunct faculty in the UW Department of Anthropology where she teaches film and culture with a focus on African film. She currently holds a position in the curatorial department of the Seattle Art Museum where she is arranging a program on learning about African culture through film and video.

The day will start with an introduction to documentary film. In the afternoon special presentations will be given on Arab, Canadian and Asian films. John Simno, President of Arab Film Distribution, will present on current films available through his distribution company and Nadine Fabbi will introduce "Obachan's Garden," an intensely personal tale about Japanese-Canadian history just released this year. Educators will be introduced to a selection of films from around the world focusing on many cultures and societies. These films, along with hundreds of others available through the Jackson School Outreach Centers, can be rented by educators at no cost. Complete film catalogs for various world regions will be available to educators at the workshop.



This year over 800 high school students from across the state took part in World Languages Day at UW. These two students selected a presentation on Inuktitut, the Inuit language, and commented that "World Languages Day made me want to go to the UW and major in a foreign language.... I liked the way the professors taught the classes - they really knew their subjects and enjoyed teaching about them."

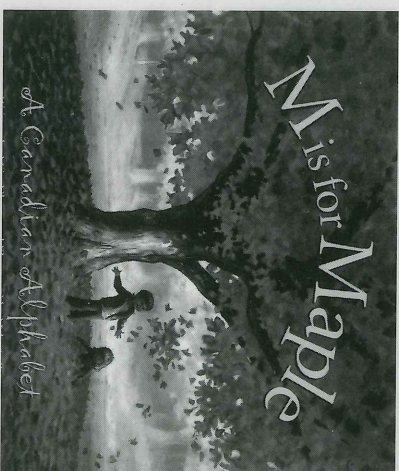

M is for Maple: A Canadian Alphabet - Written by Mike Ulmer and Illustrated by Melanie Rose - Sleeping Bear Press (ISBN 1-58536-051-1)

This beautifully illustrated alphabet picture book offers children a wonderful way to learn about Canada. From British Columbia to Newfoundland, it shares the nation's symbols, history, people and culture through use of clever rhymes, richly colored illustrations and informative text. The anecdotal information makes the book particularly useful as a classroom tool. Invite even middle school students to create similar alphabet books based on provinces or territories!

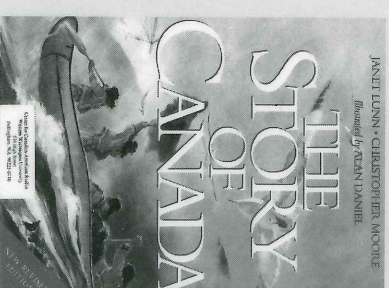


A "Must-Have" Classroom Tool

This large paperback tells Canada's history through "rich narrative, recreations of daily life, folk tales and fascinating facts." This new edition is packed with original illustrations and hundreds of photographs, maps, paintings, posters and cartoons that make the reading of Canada's history visually appealing, while the factual content written by two outstanding authors of Canadian children's literature is made fascinating. Imagine journeying across the Bering land bridge, sitting at the confederation table, photographing the last spike being driven at Craigellachie, BC, or voyaging into space, like Roberta Bondar.

The epic journey that is Canada's tale is lovingly told in this book. If you can't talk your principal into a class set, at least get one for yourself!

K-12 STUDY CANADA is a semi-annual publication of the Pacific Northwest National Resource Center for Canada (NRC) - a joint center linking the Canadian Studies Center, Henry M. Jackson School of International Studies, University of Washington to the Center for Canadian-American Studies, Western Washington University. The NRC offers quarterly workshops on specific Canadian topics; the annual, week-long STUDY CANADA seminar held the last week of June; teacher loan-kits; and an extensive Resource Library for the use of local educators. The NRC is funded through a Title VI Grant from the U.S. Department of Education and an annual Program Enhancement Grant from the Canadian Embassy, Washington, D.C.

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
