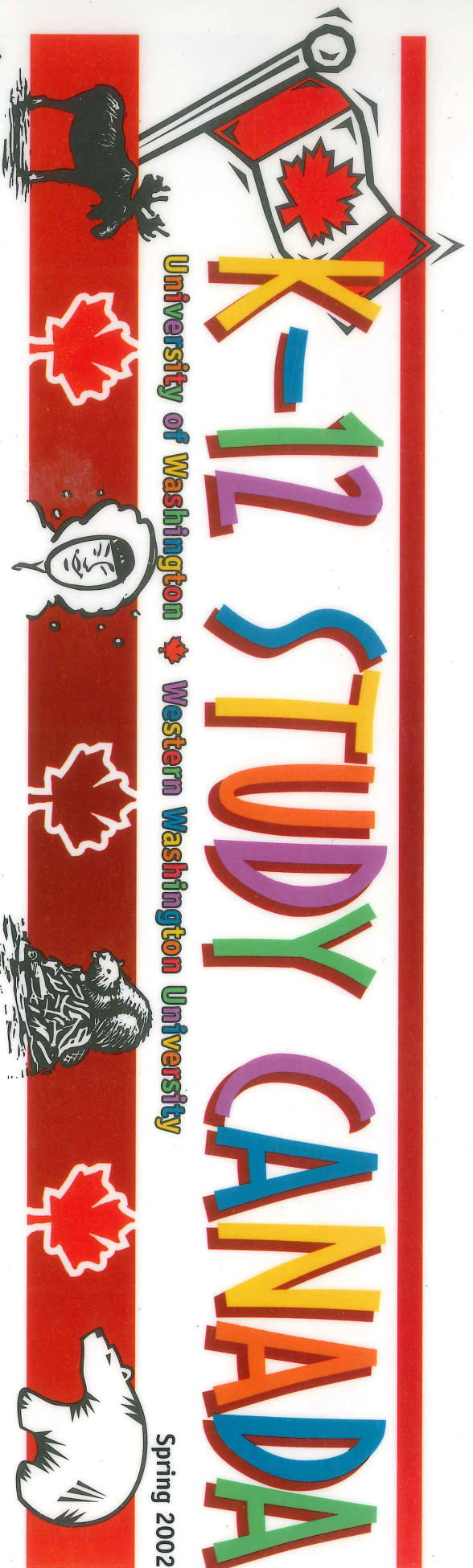

Québec in Seattle: History and Culture of Québec Workshop for Teachers (Grades 7-12)

Québec is a fascinating province — the only place in North America where the official language is French and this spring K-12 STUDY CANADA is offering an all-day workshop on the history and culture of Québec including curriculum and teaching resources.

Participants will learn about the major historical developments that have shaped the "distinct society" that is contemporary Québec. This presentation offers a brief introduction to the history of French-Canadian immigrants in the United States and their evolution into the sizeable Franco-American communities of today. Québec also extends into the Far North, home to over 8,000 Inuit, where the first documentary film, *Nanook of the North*, was made. Through the use of song, poetry, prose and video, we will see, not only how the provinces

literature reflects its culture in a most stunning fashion, but also how these works can be effectively used in the middle school and high school classroom.

Presenters are specialists from Québec, the UW, Western Washington University and SUNY Plattsburgh. Educators will also be treated to extensive curriculum materials.

This institute provides an excellent introduction to teaching Canada for K-12 teachers. Experienced teachers also attend STUDY CANADA to strengthen their knowledge base because specialists on Canadian studies discuss a wide range of topics such as Canadian history, geography, government, First Nations, environmental issues, art & literature, Québec, and Canada-US issues.

Materials for introducing and enhancing the teaching of Canada are also provided. Teachers become familiar with a variety of multimedia curriculum materials and receive the popular teaching guide, *CANADA: Northern Neighbor, 2nd Edition*, an atlas, and a CD-Rom. A one-day field trip to Vancouver, BC is included and an optional excursion to Victoria, BC (June 29-30) is offered separately at an additional cost.

The Atelier de Français is presented in both French and English to high school and community college French language teachers and provides participants with practical experience in the use of technology (software, computers, DV camcorders, language labs) for the teaching of French language and culture. The workshop is built around interactive French language software, involving Québec Theater, created by Drs. Balas and George.

Participants expand their knowledge of Québec and discover how to use its theater as a teaching tool for both language and francophone culture. Everyone receives a variety of workshop materials including two CD-ROMs on Québec theater (with accompanying software) and a CD-ROM of their own project using QuickTime movies. 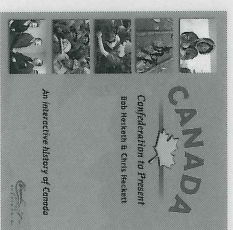

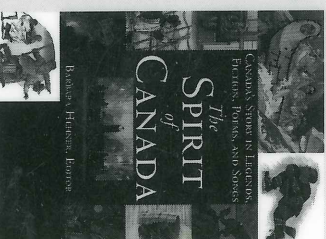

There is also a Presentation Feature for teachers/students to create, edit, save, and exchange presentations created using the CD's media resources.

excerpts, short stories, poetry and lyrics). The contributions are arranged both chronologically and thematically and blend well to paint a rich cultural portrait of Canada.
