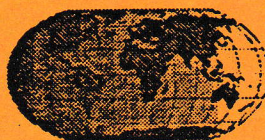
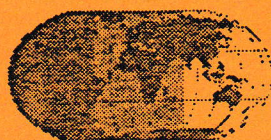

**A WORLD OF CITIES:
PROBLEMS AND TRENDS IN URBAN CENTERS**

This summer the Jackson School Outreach Program, UW faculty members, and speakers from the community at large will join forces to present a one-week summer teachers institute at the University of Washington, June 24-28, 1996. This institute, **A WORLD OF CITIES: PROBLEMS AND TRENDS IN URBAN CENTERS**, will examine cities from several perspectives: historically, problems and trends in contemporary cities, and city planning and cities of the future. The institute will be a combination of lectures and activities.

The institute coordinator is Professor Resat Kasaba, Director of the Center for International Studies in the Jackson School of International Studies. Professor Kasaba is teaching a new course at the UW this spring called "World Cities," and has also coordinated a national conference on the same subject. Confirmed speakers are:

We are also planning to discuss Tokyo.

Activities include:

- four-minute map activity
- visits to the seismic lab at the UW
- a city-walk lecture including dinner at a local restaurant
- a visit to Venice at the UW virtual reality lab
- "cities on the internet" activity.
- Seattle Sister Cities panel

We plan to have this course available either for three credits or non-credit. Clock hours will also be available to non-credit participants. Cost for all participants will be about \$130, including a continental breakfast and box lunch each day, coffee breaks, dinner one night, and some materials. Participants desiring the three credits will pay extra for the credits.

Some scholarship money is available to defray the cost of transportation or lodging for people wishing to attend this institute from outside Seattle. Priority will be given to people living more than an hour's drive from Seattle, but anyone may apply.
