Dr. Amanda Sloat is a Fellow at the Ash Center of the Harvard Kennedy School. She served in the Obama Administration, including at the State Department as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Southern Europe and Eastern Mediterranean Affairs. She previously worked at the White House, Congress and National Democratic Institute. In addition to holding visiting fellowships in the U.S. and abroad, she has served as a special advisor to the Scottish Parliament, Northern Ireland Assembly and European Commission.

Dr. Sloat holds a Ph.D. from the University of Edinburgh. She has published a book *Scotland in Europe: A Study of Multi-Level Governance* and numerous articles on European politics.
